#### COVID-19 and These Uncertain Times

Usually I struggle to think of a topic for the newsletter but world events unfortunately have made it easier this time. As some folks would say, "Who would have thunk it." We are in the midst of a pandemic in this country and worldwide. None of us have never seen anything like this in our lifetime. In talking to some clients and friends, the closest to this might be the Cuban Missile Crisis in 1962, when we were on the brink of nuclear war but I was only 7 at the time and don't remember the gravity of the crisis. I also recall as a young child going to the Courthouse in Shawano on a couple of Sundays to receive the oral polio vaccine. We received a small paper container with a sugar cube that had a pink dot in the middle of it. We took the sugar cube and it dissolved in our mouth. The last big health crisis was the 1918 flu that took millions of lives worldwide.

As things change daily with closings, health warnings, etc., I know I was a bit skeptical at first, were we overreacting to something, but lately I have changed my mind on this. Churches, schools and businesses are closing, the tax deadline has been extended in these unprecedented times. We even cancelled our March monthly meeting and I am willing to bet the April and possibly the May meetings will be cancelled. There are plenty of resources available for those needing that monthly meeting. Our website has the past 4 newsletters if you want to re-read those, plus the TCF national website has many resources along with many Facebook groups. Also know, that it is possible to contact any of us on the steering committee or the chapter cellphone. I know Mickey and I have talked to folks who just needed someone to listen to them or be reassured that they are not alone on their journey. Also, many of you have made new friends at the meetings and I am sure you have exchanged emails or phone numbers. I am sure they won't mind if you reach out to them to chat.

One thing I do recall is that after the passing of Melissa and Emily and trying to figure out why did this happen, I thought that maybe down the road and in the future that they might be spared from some awful event, be it a terrorist attack, mass shooting, nuclear war or who knows what. Perhaps this is the event, that I was trying to think of. But know this, that our children are watching over us and know what is going on with this pandemic. If you are so inclined, pray or talk to them that they help get us through these rough times.

# A Bear Hug for Father's Day

As Father's Day approaches, we are reminded of the significant contributions and unique love of fathers and stepfathers. Their defined role, after the death of their children, is to support their wives and surviving children. But their pain is deep.

Men, by their nature and in response to our society's expectations, do not usually grieve as openly as women. They do not talk as candidly about their loss. They generally do not reach out to others for comfort. They are, after all, the rock, the solid center of the family. Their wife's pain supersedes their pain because women are fragile. Or so we are told.

Yet, as I look into the eyes of so many bereaved fathers, I see a deep, gripping pain. The tears left unshed, the words that are never spoken, the anger, guilt and agony....all remain in the eyes of the bereaved father.

What can a father do? Talk with other bereaved fathers. Read books written by bereaved fathers. Talk with spouses, private counselors and close friends who are not as structured in their "male" societal roles. Try to attend three meetings of Compas-

sionate Friends. You don't have to talk. But you might decide to express a single thought or idea, logically presented, to the small group. You might find peace in this place, and then again, you might not. But, as my own dad often said, "Step up to the plate and see what happens." He was a pretty wise man.....a child of the depression, a football player, Greatest Generation, WW II Marine, a fighter, a provider, a protector....a man's man. He endured much in his 78 years, and I only saw him cry a few times.

But when his friend lost a child, my tough dad was the first one to reach out with a bear hug that wouldn't let go until the tears began to flow. They both cried. They both knew that the agony of losing a child was far worse than the horrors of war. Together, they cried.

Happy Father's Day....May your bear hugs be many and your memories become sweeter with each passing year. May your child live forever in your heart so that peace embraces you always.



# MOTHERS DAY AND GRADUATION

In Memory of my daughter, Kyra



After my daughter Kyra died on November 14 of 2004, one of my first thoughts was I am no longer a mother, because Kyra was my only child. It didn't take me long to realize that that was not true; I am and always will be Kyra's mom. As I have walked my grief journey I have found myself referring to grief as labor. It then came to me that for me, losing Kyra was like giving birth in reverse. I experienced intense emotional and physical pain that I wondered if I could endure, similar to the physical pain of labor, only in grief it lasts for weeks, months and years. It took my breath away, brought me to my knees and often I found myself crying out in anguish and anger, like child birth. It has been over a year and a half since Kyra died and I have felt a break in the pain. It has started back up recently due to graduation but I know it will ease some after May. Some women experience false labor leading up to the birth of their child. I think that those intense pains that come from out of nowhere and last only a short time is something that I will forever experience. I now realize that in letting go of her death, I can

embrace and carry her spirit with me always. So, I liken grief to giving birth in reverse.

I go from Mother's day to Graduation, because Kyra would have graduated from High School at the end of May. Graduation was something I knew would be hard for me to endure without her here, alive and being part of the celebration. I thought about what Kyra graduating would mean to me and it didn't take me long to come up with, it was going to be my day to celebrate. Kyra was an intelligent child with wonderful heart. a low attention span, a need to talk, and lower than I would have liked motivation. It was a frustration that her teachers and I shared. So. homework time was a challenge and I used motivational charts, rewards and even punishment. But, I quickly found that you can't force someone to be motivated and went back to encouraging. I knew that she would come around and become motivated and I started seeing it her Junior year the year she died. I thought that graduation would be the reward for all the long nights and constantly trying to encourage and moti-

vate. Well, it's not to be and I had to decide how will I endure graduation. I began to think about all she is missing. I believe in Heaven so I don't believe she is missing any joy or good times, because I believe she is now experiencing indescribable joy and unimaginable good times. The reality of what she is missing is, she is missing misery, pain, frustration, disappointment, a broken heart, grief, hopelessness and agony. And I am missing her incredible, joy and zest for life, her strong faith, beautiful smile and her wonderful heart.

As I close I remember when I was pregnant with Kyra, I took two helpings of food because I said I'm eating for two. Now I will try my best to live life to the fullest and be all that I can because now I'm living for two. Just as her living made me want to be a better person, her dying will make me a better person if I allow it, because I now carry her with me. I will strive to do and see life the way she would have if she could have stayed here longer.



# Milestones Kitty Reeve TCF Marin and San Francisco, CA



A kaleidoscope of images will affect all of us during this month of May, when family celebrations and gathering times abound, most especially Mother's Day, Memorial Day and high school graduation. These are days that normally mark milestones and create bonds and memories within families. As so often, the focus on family and children will touch the emptiness we carry inside our beings. It is so hard to come to grips with the ongoing reality of our child's death. We take it in as we are able, over many months and years, struggling to gain the courage and strength to accept what we cannot change.

Reading about the insights and journeys of other bereaved parents continues to help me in my own healing. Recently, the words of Ann K. Finkbeiner, in After the Death of a Child: Living with Loss through the Years, have offered me new perspectives, understanding and wisdom. In her book, Finkbeiner, a bereaved parent and a science writer, explores the long-term, large-scale effects of a child's death through a series of interviews with bereaved parents. She concludes: "In the end, I learned two things about the long-term effects of losing a child. One is that a child's death is disorienting. The human mind is wired to find patterns and attach meanings, to associate things that are alike, to generalize from one example to another, in short, to make sense of things. Your mind could no more consciously stop doing this than your heart could consciously stop beating. But children's deaths make no sense, have no precedents, are part of no pattern; their deaths are unnatural and wrong. So parents fight their wiring, change their perspectives, and adjust to a reality that makes little sense.

The other thing I learned is that letting go of a child is impossible. One of my earliest and most persistent reactions to T.C.'s death was surprise. I had no idea whatever how much he had meant to me. All I knew was that I hadn't wanted to think about it. Our children are in our blood; the bond with them doesn't seem to break, and the parents [who were interviewed] found subtle and apparently unconscious way of preserving that bond......None of this—that children are a central part of parents, are the link between the parent's past and future, are tied up with the parent's own self-image—is surprising....What is surprising is that it's true. We're not used to this sort of merger with another person. We're used to thinking of ourselves as separate individuals; we fall in love, we make alliances, we have obligations, but we do all this as free agents. We choose our own lives and die our own deaths. But we don't choose our love of, alliance with, or obligations to our children. Our children are much more central; they're something like our own humanness or our reasons for being on earth. If children are part of parents, they are not arms or legs but bones and breath...."

Perhaps Ann Finkbeiner's words will be helpful to you, as they are to me. Perhaps you have other readings to suggest or your own writings to share. I welcome them all for publication in the newsletter (to be published, articles and poems must include the author's name). In our attempts to make sense of what is senseless, let us continue to hold out our hands to one another in empathy and friendship and in honor of our beautiful children, forever loved and missed.

We received a Love gift from one of our bereaved moms and included in the envelope was a note that I would like to share:

"Greetings, you ladies who write all the memory messages, are surely the "Angels of Heaven" all your time and labor, involved, blessings to each of you."
